Mayor Jacobs Further Addresses Schools' ADA Litigation and D.C.-based Non-profit's Involvement

KNOXVILLE, Tenn.—Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs will release today around 1 p.m. a video statement about the Knox County Schools' ADA litigation.

Included in the video will be statements in support of the Knox County Board of Education and additional calls to federal Judge Ronnie Greer to act swiftly and objectively in the case.

Also, the Mayor will touch on his disappointment with <u>Democracy Forward</u>—a D.C.-based litigation non-profit led by a <u>Board</u> comprised of high-level Democrat Party operatives with ties to Hillary Clinton—bogging down our local judicial processes.

"[Democracy Forward is] making a mess of things in Knox County without care or acknowledgement of the potentially irreparable harm they are doing to so many of our students," he says.

Background: Chattanooga-based attorney Justin Gilbert has been recognized for his victory in a case that violated the Special Education Behavior Supports Act (SEBSA) and has worked on a number of isolation and restraint cases across the state. The <u>Hamilton County Herald</u> quoted him saying, "...the most meaningful cases are the ones involving abuse—when a child with a disability experiences an abusive educational environment. If I'm able to get that child out of a bad situation and into a better one—and secure compensation for the parents—then I can feel good about the work I've done."

Jackson-based <u>Jessica Salonus</u>' website identifies her as an attorney who serves clients throughout the state in "disability discrimination, retaliation, and failure to accommodate claims under the ADA."
